
VILLAGE HALL NEWS

The committee has no events planned for the summer other than hosting the monthly pub nights and of course the forthcoming Beer Festival. We are planning another quiz night in the



autumn but a date has yet to be set. However, the building is being well used, with two cycling groups using the facilities as a break in organised tours; two wedding receptions; a birthday party and the Chapel fellowship meal. All these events are planned for the summer and early autumn, plus of course our regular users the monthly Coffee Mornings, Bowls Club, Parish Council and the Church's Big Breakfast.

The committee, however, is currently focusing on the fabric of the hall. There is ongoing concern about the deteriorating crack in the gable wall to the left of the main toilet door. The view is that the toilet extension is coming away from the main building and in doing so is pulling on the back wall. One possible suggestion for this is that the toilet foundations were not dug sufficiently deep. Jane H has obtained grants to enable us to hire an independent surveyor to assess the extent of the problem. We are also in contact with our insurance company with a view to arranging an assessment of the situation. One possible solution may be underpinning the whole toilet block. However, at the moment we are just waiting for a professional assessment of the situation and hopefully the matter can be resolved through our insurance before it poses a danger. That said the hall is currently completely safe to use and it could be another two years before matters become serious, by which time it should have been resolved. So do continue to hire the hall!!



Continuing with the theme of the hall fabric, Ant R has removed the wooden panelling and plastic sheeting from around the rose window and has cleaned away fifty years' worth of dead flies and cobwebs. Close examination has revealed that while the centre window glass is in a very fragile condition the other panels are

fairly robust and the stone around each is sound. Research as to the design of the original glass has drawn a blank so we have decided to go with plain glass. This was the preferred choice of the majority who attended last year's rose window meeting. Finally having decided on what we want, the next step is to find someone experienced in working on such a project. Money is available through the New Homes Bonus scheme and rough estimates have come up with a figure of £4k for the enterprise. It is hoped that by the time of the next newsletter I will be able to report on further progress with both the gable wall and the rose window.

Finally if you are considering hiring the hall, it would be easier if payment could be made using BACS. Contact Julie L, our treasurer, and she will give you the village hall bank a/c no. and sort code. Our current problem is that the Nat West bank in Towcester, which we use, is closing in September. This makes paying in cheques/cash more problematic as our nearest branch will be Stony Stratford.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Dear All

We have recently held the Annual Assembly and the following is quoted from The Chairman's Annual Report: "It has proved enormously helpful and successful to have a full Council this



year of 7 members, and I do appreciate all the time and effort that they have put into work in hand. The financial position is healthy and looked after very efficiently by our Vice Chairman Paul Featherstone, who will be reporting in more detail later in the meeting. Our clerk has been aware of all possibilities in acquiring grants for the various new projects initiated. Through these grants this year, we have achieved the installation of the Defibrillator and the Speed Radar signs and our next project of the redesign and build of a new website is well underway."

I want to thank all who came to support the Council and also those who represent the groups within the village and gave updated reports on finance, activities and future plans etc. These and information from our County Councillor and District Councillor will be enclosed with the minutes in due course.

You will all be aware by now that the Defibrillator is installed and up and running with a Training Day fixed. Let's hope that the Speed Radar in action is benefiting parishioners on the High Street and Helmdon Road. It has been resolved that the domain www.wappenhamvillage.org will be registered for the new website, with the clerk's new email to be parishclerk@wappenhamvillage.org.uk.

We have some helpful new safety signs installed on approaches to Slapton Bridge junction but will continue to investigate the barrier fencing, which is in an appalling condition. I expect everyone is pleased with the road improvements to Towcester and the efficiency to us of the now completed roundabout, although I guess it might be a little different in the early 2020s when the northbound A5 traffic will join the A43 between Silverstone and Towcester! There are still ongoing discussions regarding the merits or not of the Freedom of the Village project.

It will probably not be a surprise to many of you that I am not seeking re-election as Chairman at the Annual Parish Meeting and so I will end by writing my deep appreciation of so many who have stood by me over my intermittent 12 years as Chairman. My recent particular thanks must go to Paul F and Liz H, without whose wit, help and knowledge I could not have survived. Looking back at my records, I realise I have been on the Council for 34 unbroken years and that I have served 17 in the last century and 17 in the 21st!


Thank you to my Council colleagues and everyone in Wappenham for the patience you have shown over many years.

I receive a lot of thank-you notes, for the weddings I've taken, the children I've baptized and sadly all too often for the funerals I've ministered at. But I have to admit, I'm a terrible thank-you note writer myself and it's not the



notes of thanks I forget, sometimes I'm so busy I even forget to thank God.

But here in the Astwell Benefice we have a huge amount to say thank you for, not just the very special area we are lucky enough to live in, but our schools, our communities and of course our wonderfully ancient Churches. Did you know that there has been a site of worship here in the village for over 800 years? But it is fair to say that our Church has only survived this long because of the support of its community: from the building works that would have been a real community endeavour, through to all those who attend worship and help support the ministry and mission down the centuries.

The Church has faced some pretty big threats before, the Reformation, the Commonwealth and even the Victorians, who remodelled the church out of all earlier recognition. But today we face an even bigger threat.

As well as a hog roast and a speaker from the City Farm, we will be holding the annual blessing of the tractors – big and small, old and new. Everyone is welcome.

On **June 24th** we are holding a benefice-wide **Astwell Wedding Fair** show casing all that we can offer potential brides and grooms, from the ceremony, through to reception venues, photographers, beauty, dresses, suits, cakes and flowers, this will be your one stop shop for everything Wedding.

FROM WAPPENHAM CHAPEL

Knowing where you are going It's easy to feel lost in our directionless society today. The theory of evolution leaves us with no roots and no purpose. Where



we come from, what we are here for and where we are ultimately heading are questions that many simply don't want to face up to, because the alternatives all seem so bleak. As one Russian philosopher has put it, "Life is like a country where there are no signposts because there is nowhere to go". There are times when we can identify with Alice in Wonderland when she came to a fork in the road and didn't know which way to turn. She looked up to find a grinning Cheshire Cat.

"Please, Mr Cat, help me. Tell me which road I should take?"
"That depends," said the cat. "Where are you going?" "I don't know," muttered the confused Alice. "Then it doesn't matter...," said the fiendish cat.

And that's where we are today! We are told we have no roots, nor destiny so we have no meaning either. So it doesn't matter which road you take or how you live your life if you don't know where you are going!

The **absurdity** of this position is surely obvious to all. How can the life of a peacemaker like Nelson Mandela have no more meaning than the likes of Ian Brady! But if we have nowhere to go to, as we are told today, then it doesn't matter which road we take. You can be a Mandela or a Brady, it makes no difference. We are all on a road to nowhere; a life-long cul-de-sac.

"You know the way"

On the night he was betrayed, Jesus told his disciples that the reason he was going to the cross was to prepare a place for them and that **they knew the way** to that place. But they were still confused. Thomas expressed what they were all thinking when he said, "Lord, we don't know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus' reply was categorical. "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." John 14:1-6

If anyone else had said that we would be at liberty to disregard those words as the thoughts of someone who was delusional or just plain arrogant. But it was Jesus who said it! The One who loved us so much that the very next day he was about to lay down his life to open the way for us to go to the Father.

ABTHORPE PUB SOLD!

It's possibly the most important piece of news to come out of Abthorpe since the Royal Visit by King George V in September 1913. Abthorpe pub has been sold!



Whilst there are large for sale banners

outside the pubs in nearby Greens Norton and Blakesley, the sale of our pub was unheralded and took place below the radar. Who has purchased our ancient stone-built hostelry from the Hook Norton Brewery? It's Rob S our landlord, and rather than being upset the village is delighted.

Rob, a farmer from the next village of Slapton, became the landlord of our pub in August 2008. At that time the pub was struggling and many locals feared that it was destined for closure. From his first night as landlord, when some of his family wore L plates on their backs to emphasise they were on a steep learning curve, things changed. Customers packed the bars and the restaurant became known for its good quality, delicious and reasonably priced food. To this day it remains a vibrant, traditional safe haven in the Northamptonshire countryside for locals and visitors alike.

Rob S is most modest about his wonderful achievement and simply commented that "..... it's nice to get control of our pub to ensure its future for our local village community."

And for those who are anxious that they will no longer be able to quaff a pint of their favourite *Hooky*, Rob assures us that although his pub is now a Free House, a long term agreement has been signed with the brewery for the supply of its ales. Cheers!!
